OPERATION RESTART FREEDOM

This is how the "systems people" and "ORDER FOLLOWERS" will return to freedom:

First of all, the so called orders no longer serve any pupose because the "purpose of making orders" ... " in times of a declared emergency"... is the set of words used in section 7.0.2 (1) of the EMACPA.

The Declaration of Emergency had been revoked on July 24, 2020.

All so called orders have no purpose beyond July 24, 2020. They are therefore neutralized. This makes common sense.

Having said that, the "ORDER FOLLOWERS" need to actually hear that these unlawful orders are no longer in force.

This can happen in 2 simple ways according to the Reopening Ontario Act.

- 1) The orders are only good for 30 days at a time unless extended by the Lieutenant Governor (see below).
- 2) The orders are REVOKED by the Lieutenant Governor. (see below)

That's it. These are the only 2 simple possibilities.

SOLUTION TO FREEDOM:

- 1) Make it such that the "orders" do not get "extended", and therefore terminate at the end of 30 days.
- 2) Make it such that the Lieutenant Governor "revokes" all orders ASAP.

THE LAWS:

REOPENING ACT:

Time limit on application of orders

3 (1) An order continued under section 2 ceases to apply <u>30 days</u> after it is continued under section 2, subject to extension under subsection (2).

Extension of orders

(2) The <u>Lieutenant Governor</u> in Council may by order, before it ceases to apply, <u>extend the effective period of an order for periods of no more than 30 days.</u>

Power to revoke orders

5 The <u>Lieutenant Governor</u> in Council may by order <u>revoke an order</u> continued under section 2.

Termination of COVID-19 declared emergency

17 Unless it has been terminated before this section comes into force, the COVID-19 declared emergency is terminated and Ontario Regulation 50/20 (Declaration of Emergency) is revoked.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND CIVIL PROTECTION ACT:

Emergency powers and orders - Purpose

7.0.2 (1) <u>The purpose of making orders</u> under this section is to promote the public good by protecting the health, safety and welfare of the people of Ontario <u>in times of declared</u> emergencies in a manner that is subject to the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.
